- critically evaluate the contributions of major Indian writers in English and the unique traits of Indian Writing in English.

CC5: AMERICAN LITERATURE

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- understand the evolution of American literature from the colonial era to the present, its diversity, and its distinguished artistic features.
- comprehend the socio-cultural and intellectual contexts as represented in the texts.
- analyze concepts of the 'American Dream', transcendentalism, psychoanalysis, and a quest for mystery and adventure as articulated in the texts.
- critique race, class, and gender as social constructs as expressed in different literary texts.
- evaluate the thoughts, beliefs, struggles, and visions of African-American writers and their contributions to developing the American literary canon.





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CC6: POPULAR LITERATURE

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- develop a critical understanding of the characteristics of popular literature and its association with mass culture.
- identify how issues of gender, sexuality, class, race and ethnicity are perceived and explored in popular culture and literature.
- investigate the power relations which separate popular literature i.e. commercially successful literature from classical, "elite" literary genres and the ways in which popular culture negotiate the margins of the canonical.
- analyze and explore the creativity embedded in the popular genres of science fiction, thriller, romance, mystery, detective fiction, nonsense verse etc. and its offering of a radical alternative to 'realist' literary fiction.

CC7: BRITISH POETRY AND DRAMA (17TH – 18TH CENTURY)

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- comprehend the specific zeitgeist of the time and how it is different from the previous era.
- outline some cutting-edge works from the genre of poetry and drama, which enable them
 to construct a clear idea as to how each age produced appropriate and conducive
 conditions for certain texts to come into being.
- develop a sense of how to identify and locate the nature of these texts within the larger tradition of the history of English literature.
- critically analyze and examine how the notions of "good", "bad", "evil", "hero", "villain", "victim", etc. are constructed.

CC8: BRITISH LITERATURE (18TH CENTURY)

After completion of this course students will be able to:

comprehend how the unique social and intellectual background of the 18th Century
British literature inspired the proliferation of both fiction and non-fiction with the same
vigour. There are important periodical writers like Joseph Addison as well as excellent
novelists like Daniel Defoe.

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- familiarize themselves with excellent restoration dramas such as *Way of the World* and understand as to why they are called the "comedy of manners".
- critically examine how more often than not the "literary" and the "political" are intimately linked.
- identify how the political phenomenon of the restoration of monarchy in England had wide and far-reaching literary-cultural ramifications.

CC9: BRITISH ROMANTIC LITERATURE

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- understand the importance of the Romantic Movement and the impact of Romanticism on British literature.
- comprehend the significant traits of British Romantic literature and how these are represented and reflected in different works of this literary period.
- analyze the role of imagination and the relationship between man and Nature as expressed in British Romantic poetry.
- evaluate the concepts of idealism, pantheism, and individualism as expressed in the literary works of the Romantic age.
- estimate the use of different literary devices like imagery, metaphor, and symbolism as employed by the writers to articulate their aesthetic and artistic perspectives.

CC10: 19TH CENTURY BRITISH LITERATURE

After completion of this course students will be able to:

• identify the major historical and socio-intellectual developments and the cultural context of nineteenth century England, for instance the impact of the industrial revolution, expanded literacy and scientific, technological and religious transformations in the writing of the period.

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- appraise the Victorian understanding of femininity and contrast it with the shifting perception of women's roles in society, most notably embedded in the 'New Woman' fiction.
- acquaint with shifting class structures and racial politics in the prose, poetry and nonfiction of the period.
- enable the students to critically explore the concept of Victorian Compromise and anxieties about modernity.
- empower the students to identify experimental literary genres like the macabre, sensation fiction, detective fiction, Victorian gothic etc and literary trends of realism in nineteenth century English literature.

AND COMPOSITION

CC11: WOMEN'S WRITINGS

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- understand the socio-political realities and contexts of the texts and the position of women in society in different geographical and socio-cultural settings.
- trace the evolution of women's emancipation movements and the evolution of feminist thought.
- apply their understanding and knowledge of feminism as a social and critical movement to engage themselves in researching feminist discourse and women's writings.
- critique and defend the concepts of class, race, and gender as social constructs and how these influence women's lives and their writings.
- estimate the plurality of female experiences, their anxieties, and concerns, and their thought and psyche as expressed in a variety of literary genres including poetry, novels, short stories, and autobiography.





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CC 12: EARLY 20TH CENTURY BRITISH LITERATURE

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- situate the 20th Century in the devastating context of the two world wars and the consequent aftermath of such events.
- appreciate the literary-cultural experimentations and modernist and postmodernist movements that went into the making of the diverse British literary canon of the 20th century.
- deconstruct the very act of reading in the wake of different critical literary theories and radical philosophical developments.
- widen their existing knowledge to delve deeper into the psychological aspects of literary characters of texts like *Heart of Darkness and Sons and Lovers*.
- motivate themselves to think beyond normative justifications and evaluate for themselves
 the consequences of phenomena such as European colonialism, mindless consumerism,
 lures of capitalism, glorification of war and geopolitical aggression, etc.

DSE A2: LITERARY THEORY AND CRITICISM

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- identify the major critical discourses across different literary periods in literature.
- distinguish literary theory from literary criticism.
- dissect major critical discourses and formulate their own opinions about them.
- determine the corresponding texts where these theories could be applied

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and elaborate the ideas based on learnt concepts.

 discover the aporias and gaps in critical thinking and develop research questions for further introspection.

DSE B1: LITERARY TYPES, RHETORIC AND PROSODY

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- recall the basic concepts of literary forms from the previous semesters and apply them to create critical essays on them.
- interpret the different characteristics of short stories as a genre and defend the same with consistent references to texts.
- classify the different metres in English poetry and apply the techniques of scansion to given pieces.
- utilize the list of figures of speech to develop a deeper understanding of stylistics in poetry.
- modify their understanding of poetry through an introspective assessment of poetic forms, metres and ornamentation.

CC13: MODERN EUROPEAN DRAMA

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- identify and assess the social and political transformations which enabled the evolution of modern European drama.
- examine the differences between European dramas from the Elizabethan period to the early 20th century European drama with changing techniques (use of satire, irony and absurdity) and realist, naturalist themes.
- appraise the contribution of *avant-garde*, experimental art traditions of Europe and America which challenge bourgeois ideals within the modern theatrical movement.
- examine the radical gender, racial and class politics within the works of major modern European dramatists.

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• appraise the active relationship of art and the audience in modern European plays and its role in transforming society.

CC14: POSTCOLONIAL LITERATURES

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- critique the salient features of colonialism and postcolonialism.
- evaluate texts by applying the understanding of postcolonialism as a movement.
- explain the textual underpinnings through a postcolonial lens.
- estimate the contemporary relevance of postcolonial literature in modern culture studies.
- assess the role of postcolonial literature in a wider understanding of global literature and society.

DSE-A3: PARTITION LITERATURE

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- understand the plight of the destitute, their trauma, and their suffering after the partition of the Indian subcontinent.
- analyze the concepts of nationhood, citizenship, the notion of identity, home and homelessness, colonialism and anti-colonial nationalism, displacement, and refugees in the context of partition literature.
- look beyond the shadow lines of separation to have a wider understanding of socio, political and cultural constructs.
- evaluate how the theme of partition in the Indian context is treated by writers in different literary genres.







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• develop a profound understanding of history in the context of the partition of the Indian subcontinent and its reflection in the partition narrative.

DSE B3: AUTOBIOGRAPHY

After completion of this course students will be able to:

- realize and critique the relevance of the genre of "autobiography" in order to get a holistic picture of a particular society.
- assess and recognize the experiences and stories of iconic personalities such as Rabindranath Tagore, Binodini Dasi, Mahatma Gandhi, Nirod C. Chaudhuri, etc.
- critique, re-evaluate and form diverse opinions about these exceptional personalities, their contributions in respective fields and their public perceptions in the light of their autobiographies.
- imagine how personalities belonging from particular historical periods both represent and critique their contemporary society and polity.
